What is the Maine Writing Project?

As a part of the National Writing Project, the Maine Writing Project works to connect K-16 educators through sites and events such as the Summer Institute as well as online networks that last a lifetime. The focus of the Writing Project is to bring together experienced teachers and writers to teach and learn with other teachers writing through practice, advancing leadership, spreading expertise, and helping everyone develop as a writer.

The Summer Institute: Writers as Teachers, Teachers as Writers

The Institute of Maine Writing Project is a collaborative workshop that introduces participants to the principles and practices of the National Writing Project, and supports each educator in developing original writing as well as instructional practice.

Participants will work directly with expert teacher-consultants, and receive feedback and instruction in collaboration with their peers.

This institute can be taken for three graduate credits or 45 contact hours.
